


Extreme Weather Response

Monthly disturbance calls originating from the public and Transit Public Safety officers city-wide.



*The increase in calls can be attributed to a few key factors: increased proactive enforcement (with a 30% increase in Transit Public Safety Officers in 2024), adverse weather conditions, and significant growth in ridership. So far, transit ridership saw an increase of over 1 million trips per month during the first 3 quarters of 2024, now exceeding 10 million trips each month.


Calgary Fire Overdose Response

CFD supports Alberta Health Services (AHS) Emergency Medical Services (EMS) by co-responding to lifethreatening medical emergencies like drug poisonings.





Mentoring At-Risk MASST Youth through Transitions

This program provides ongoing support for youth who exhibit high-risk behavior by connecting them with a network of mentors and relationships that foster resilience, mitigate risk, and encourage positive life choices. The program helps youth who transition from the Multi-Agency School Support Team (MASST) which is a joint partnership between the Calgary Police Service, Calgary Board of Education, Calgary Catholic School District, City of Calgary, and Alberta Health Services.

Community Impact

- 90% of clients reported an increase in relationship skills from the agency's annual client survey.
- When asked upon annual check-in if clients would like to continue meeting with a mentor again next year, 82% responded 'yes'.
- 89% of mentees in the program indicated that their mentors are always or often someone they can trust
- 84% of children and youth improved their capability to make responsible decisions

Stay safe around storm ponds this winter

As temperatures warm up, many people are eager to get outside and enjoy winter, but The City wants to remind Calgarians that storm ponds are never a safe place to play because the ice thickness is always unpredictable. Any recreational activity, on or in these ponds, is not safe and is strictly prohibited under the Stormwater Bylaw. Do not walk, skate, sled or play on a storm pond. Also remember to keep your pets off the ice as they are not aware of the dangers. "Although they may look inviting, no activities are allowed on storm ponds because they're just not safe", explains Calgary Fire Department spokesperson Carol Henke. The Downtown Safety Leadership Table was a representative group of downtown leaders convened to help identify opportunities, solutions, and strategies to address safety issues in downtown Calgary. In March 2024, they released 28 **recommendations** to support safety and vibrancy in Calgary's downtown. We are pleased to say that work is already underway on all 28 recommendations in the timelines anticipated. The work is targeted to three key areas: great public spaces, wellbeing of people, and emergency response and enforcement.
